


HOW AN NWAS SURVEY WORKS

A sound/pressure wave can often be sent as deep as 1000 or more feet into the ground. This sound/pressure wave causes a small movement in the rock

formation. If there is water present in the rock formation below the sound/ pressure wave the water moves (ripples) slightly. When the water moves it causes a very small change or disturbance (electro kinetic) in the bond between the rock and the water. The small electrical signal that is created by this change or disturbance travels to the surface at the speed of light. The stronger the signal the more water available. The speed at which the signal comes to the surface is generally used to determine the depth of the water. If little or no signal is returned then there is either no significant water in the rock formation below or there is water with high dissolved solids (salt) in the rock formation. Our equipment records the signals and we provide a printed report of the computed results. A survey with four or more soundings can map approximately 12,000 square feet and accurately show the estimated groundwater depth, quality, and quantity (yield).

THE MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS FOR A NWAS SURVEY TO BE **COMPLETED ON MY PROPERTY**


There are only a few minimum requirements: 1) we need to have safe access to each sounding site with our 4X4 vehicle (otherwise in acceptable weather we can do remote soundings which are an additional cost). 2) The area to be tested generally needs to be a minimum of 40 to 50 feet away from any type of electrical power source (primarily underground power and some buildings). 3) We need to have enough unobstructed surface sediment (topsoil) to drive (install) four 3 foot 3 inch long 3/4 inch diameter electrodes into the ground. The electrodes are placed in a straight line and require an area that is approximately 16 feet long and 2 feet wide to complete each sounding. The NWAS definition of unobstructed surface sediments is surface sediments that contain approximately 30% or less large gravel or cobbles. If the surface sediments contain more than 30% large

gravel or cobbles then more soundings may be required to collect a sufficient amount of definitive information. THE SURVEY LOCATION

In most cases, the property owner tells us the general area that they would like to have their well, which is where we complete the survey. If you are unsure of approximately where you would like your well drilled or there are a number of dry or poor performing wells in the area then you have a few options to narrow the search for the right place to complete the survey. One option is to have fracture tracing (used primarily in areas with bedrock near the surface) completed on your property. Another option is to have a study of the existing wells in the area, which may help find a pattern common to the good wells. A final option is to have NorthWest Aquifer Surveying complete and extended sounding profile survey (soundings completed in a line but separated by approximately 300 feet) completed across your property which will help us located some good areas to focus on with a more detailed close sounding profile survey.

SOUNDINGS NEEDed per PROP-

Every property varies and some properties need many more soundings than others but as a general rule we recommend a survey consisting of a minimum of four soundings (completed in a profile or grid pattern separated by 85 to 150 feet) for a single house domestic well and a survey consisting of a minimum of eight soundings for agricultural or multi-home wells. We also recommend that the soundings be completed in a profile or an organized pattern of some kind.

Until now, there were very few accurate and affordable options to locate wells. The two most common options are either picking a spot or well witching. Most well drillers will not suggest where to drill a well because of the potential liability involved. NWAS will survey your property and provide a printed report containing approximate water depth, water quality, and approximate flow rate.



The Hardy Heater

The Hardy furnace does not require special equipment to transport or relocate. The furnace firebox is constructed of 14 and 16 gauge 304 stainless steel for the best heat transfer possible. The heat transfer efficiency is three times better with 16 GA. 304 stainless steel than with 3/8" carbon steel. The stainless steel firebox also resists rusting and burnout that occurs in standard carbon steel. The stainless steel smoke stack that passes through the water chamber resists burnout and corrosion. The insulated stainless steel firebox door and ash door holds the heat in and resists burnout and corrosion. The firebox comes standard with thick heavy cast iron grates to make weekly ash removal simple and fast.

The use of chemicals inside the water tank isn't necessary because of the corrosion resistance of 304 stainless steel. Since hot water evaporates, Hardy invented a condenser stack located on the rear of the furnace which condenses the steam and returns it to the water tank. The tank is vented to the atmosphere to eliminate the safety hazards common with pressurized boilers.

Standard features on Hardy furnaces are an adjustable aquastat, combustion blower for damper control, 4 GPM at 20 feet of heat circulator pump with on/off control relay and automatic water level controls. The standard Hardy also comes equipped with a heat exchanger to provide hot water for your domestic use. The Hardy provides hot water for hot air duct systems, water baseboard, radiant floor heat, unit heaters and other existing hydronic systems. Hardy has several models available ranging from 100,000 BTU to 250,000 BTU.

energy security, jobs, a healthier environment, and rural economic benefits. Some 2,500 megawatts (MW) of new wind power generating capacity—a capital investment of over \$3 billion--were installed in 2005, according to initial estimates by the American Wind Energy Association (AWEA). Wind farms in the U.S. now total over 9,000 MW in capacity and generate enough electricity to serve 2.4 million homes. That's still less than 1% of U.S. electricity supply, but by 2020, wind energy technology could provide 6% of the nation's electricity—a share similar to hydropower today.

Tind energy is growing fast, helping bring across Amer-

ica electric price stability,

The drivers are strong: proven technology, attractive cost, vast potential, investor interest, strong demand. The outlook for wind power is bullish, and could be even stronger over the longer term, depending on how soon and how successfully constraints and obstacles to its growth are rolled back. Meanwhile, AWEA expects three record-setting years for wind energy at least through December 31, 2007, the date when an important federal incentive, the production tax credit, is next set to expire.

Proven technology:

Modern wind turbines are at the cutting edge of energy technology. Utility-scale turbines feature sophisticated electronic equipment and controls and advanced composite materials that allow the turbines to reap ever-larger amounts of energy from the winds. Modern utility-scale wind turbines are tall—reaching some 400 feet high to the tip of the blade. The turbines' computers collect and process over 200 types of data, from wind speeds and oil temperature to voltage dips on the grid. At good

windy locations, a single 1.5-megawatt wind turbine (the average size installed in 2005) generates enough to power 500 (that's five hundred) average American households, year after year.

Wind turbines can contribute to overall grid reliability thanks to high-tech features. Moreover, new studies show that utilities can significantly expand wind power in their portfolios without major adjustments in the planning, operations, or reliability of their systems, even though the output from wind farms can vary with the wind. These studies confirm what has long been the experience in Europe, where Denmark and certain regions of Germany and Spain generate 20% or more of their electricity from the





wind farm is built, the cost of the power that it generates is steady because there is no cost of fuel. For a utility, acquiring wind power is therefore similar to locking in a long-term, fixed-rate mortgage. More wind power can therefore help stabilize electricity prices.

The cost of wind power has come down by 80% since the first commercial wind turbines were installed in the 1980s. Meanwhile, over the past several years, the cost of fuel used for electricity generation - natural gas in particular, but now even coal-has increased, sometimes dramatically. "The wind blowing across the fertile farmland of southeast Washington is one of the cleanest, most affordable sources of electricity available today," according to Puget Sound Energy, Washington state's largest energy utility.

Utilities seeking to manage fuel cost are now finding that wind energy can be an attractive option for new generation. Wind energy development can also help cut consumers' bills by lowering demand for natural gas -- particularly during winter peak demand -- and by extending its supply.

More wind power means lower natural gas prices

The current growth in wind power construction comes at a time when customers across the country are facing electricity and natural gas rate hikes due to the natural gas supply shortage, with 2005-2006 winter gas prices projected at \$10-13/thousand cubic foot (mcf), compared to last year's average prices of \$5-7/mcf. And high natural gas prices can hit farming and ranching communities doubly hard since they also make the price of fertilizer go up.

Because every unit of electricity that is produced by a wind farm is one for which the country does not have to burn natural gas or other resources, using more wind power helps reduce skyrocketing natural gas prices by reducing the demand for natural gas. "Wind power's rapid growth provides what is potentially the quickest and best supply-side option to ease the natural gas shortage," said AWEA Executive Director Randall Swisher.

Economic development benefits

Wind energy creates jobs. In the manufacturing sector, for example, Gamesa, a leading global manufacturer of wind turbines, is planning a manufacturing facility in Pennsylvania to serve the growing U.S. market. A California-based company, Clipper Windpower, has opened a plant in Iowa, where it manufactures a new line of large new wind turbines. And some 90 companies in 25 states currently produce wind turbine components. Additional job creation flows into non-manufacturing sectors such as construction, transportation, marketing,

financial, and other services.

for rural counties and communities, and help farmers and ranchers diversify their income and stay on the land. Sherman County, in eastern Oregon, is a "one-crop" county that depends on dryland wheat farming and ranks last out of the state's 36 in per capita income. After the 24-MW Klondike wind farm was built, the project generated for the county during its first year of operation: \$321,205 in property tax revenues (10% increase), including for schools; annual royalty payments to landowners of \$2,000-\$4,000 for each turbine on their land; 80 to 100 temporary jobs during project construction; and 3 full-time technical positions. Klondike was expanded by an additional 75MW in 2005 with the community's full support.

The large 162-MW Colorado Green project in rural Prowers County, Colorado—an agricultural area that grows mainly alfalfa and has been hit by drought over the past several years-- increased the county's tax base by 29%, adding annual payments of about \$917,000 to the general school fund, \$203,000 to the school bond fund. \$189,000 to a county medical center. In Texas, the record-breaking thousand megawatts of wind power installed in 2001 in the state provided on an annual basis \$11.6 million in property tax payments to local schools and \$2.5 million in landowner royalty income, and created 2,500 wind-related jobs. And Minnesota saw in 2005 the construction of the 100.5-MW Trimont wind farm, the largest wind project with local farmer ownership in the U.S.

Vast resource potential

U.S. wind resources are vast—theoretically able to meet more than twice total U.S. electricity consumption today, according to the U.S. Department of Energy. In order to generate 15% of the country's electricity (twice what hydropower generates today), only 0.6% of the land in the lower 48 states would need to be developed with wind power.

Within that area, most existing land use such as farming and ranching, would continue as it is now, with crops growing up to the foot of the turbines. Tapping only a fraction of America's vast






The kit is designed to provide additional support of the steering sector shaft and eliminate sector shaft play in the steering box. It also helps keep the pickup frame from flexing at the steering box mounting point.

The stabilizer uses existing mounting holes. It adds an outboard support bearing to the sector shaft. This additional bearing is attached to the lower end of the sector shaft by way of a replacement nut, which has an integral shaft extension. The bearing supplied is a regreasable high quality unit available at most Ag outlets. Nearly all the sector shaft load is carried by this outboard bearing, thus relieving the steering box of much wear and tear.

Installation takes about a half hour and requires no drilling or welding.

The Dodge Adjustable Track Bar (DAT) was recently introduced by Russell Tessier of Solid Steel Industries, Weyburn, Sask. Tessier says the new adjustable track bar is designed to replace the existing OEM track bar on Dodge 4-WD pickups made from 1994 to 2002.

"These Dodge series 4-WD trucks have a track bar that holds the front axle centered from side to side." Says Tessier. On the upper end of these factory track bars is a ball joint, much like a tie rod end. The problem is that this ball joint often fails prematurely. As it wears out, the front axle is allowed to move side to side, causing excessive wandering." That, says Tessier, contributes to a problem called the "death wobble".

"The death wobble is a violent shaking in the front end that usually happens when the truck hits a bump or pothole in the road. Usually, the truck won't come out of it until you drop the speed down to 10 to 15 mph. It can be very dangerous. A loose or worn track bar isn't the only cause of the death wobble, but it's a major contributor to the problem." He says.

Solid Steel's track bar conversion kit has high quality rubber bushings at both ends, thus elimination the troublesome ball joint. It's adjustable, and works on tracks with up to 3 in. of lift.

According to Tessier, one other problem with the factory ball joint version track bar is that it's expensive to replace. "When the ball joint wears out the whole track bar has to be replaced. If the rubber brushings on our adjustable track bar ever wear out, new brushings can be pressed in at minimal cost.

"Many people have had to replace the factory track bar on their Dodge Rams every 30,000 miles or sooner. It's sometimes hard to tell if the track bar is worn out. The best way is to look at the upper ball joint end to the track bar while someone turns the steering wheel back and forth a few times (with the truck parked, of course). If you see any movement in the ball end, there's wear and the truck will wander. Our rubber bushings are designed to outlast the Dodge factory track bar as well as the Moog replacement track bar."

The adjustable track bar sells for \$299. A conversion kit to install the track bar sells for \$175.





In 1978, we trademarked the name "Calf Claim" and started to market our product thru some of the smaller veterinary product distributors that called upon us. These sanctions against our beef have



What Motivates a Horse to Go?

etting a horse to move forward has always been the most important issue with regard to training. If the horse won't move forward, then we can't effectively train him. Feet that are stuck don't make for a fun ride either in the arena or out on the trail.

The question has always been, "What's the best way?" And "what should we use?" There are all sorts of devices to utilize in making an impression on the horse to move forward. What amazes me is that there seems to be some issue between disciplines as to what's correct, safe, or fair. On more than one occasion, I've heard a trainer or clinician make fun of other riding styles and their choice of "motivational" devices.

I've heard people say, "Sticks are for kids." And I've heard, "I would never hit my horse with a whip." And of course someone will always ask, "Why do they slap them with their mecate?"

Since all of these tools and many more are designed in some way to make the horse move forward, and because at one time or another I've used various methods while riding different disciplines, I have a good understanding of most of these methods.

Whether you use a crop, bat, whip, rein, switch, stick, mecate rein, rope, spur, lariat, flag, or a simple "giddy-up", click, cluck, or kiss – you're correct.

Quite honestly your horse isn't concerned with what tool you choose to motivate him. All of these tools tap, bump, push, slap, or in some way encourage the horse to move forward. It's just that the "giddy-up, click, kiss, or cluck" don't make physical contact.

But I can assure you that, before the horse learned to respond to those sounds, some type of contact or threat of contact was made with a piece of equipment. I don't know of any horse that learned to move into the trot by someone standing twenty feet away making kissing sounds and doing nothing else. Try it. Walk into a pasture of untrained horses, get within about 20 feet, make a kissing sound and see how many pick up a trot. If they do, it's more likely they simply didn't want you any closer than twenty feet.

So what's my point? Simply this...it isn't the means with which we motivate the horse. Rather it's how we use the means that makes the difference.

How many of you have heard of or know of a horse that's afraid of the sound of a whip slicing through the air? Chances are that this response has developed because someone was a little too aggressive with the whip and failed to let the horse understand that it doesn't always mean danger or pain.

Improper use of any of the tools discussed here will make the horse extremely agitated, and probably ready to move out rapidly. But they can also be used to such an extent that the horse becomes dull to them. I know of horses that have been hit so many times with a whip/stick that they just quit moving away from it. Those horses are often proclaimed as dull. I have seen the same result with spurs. What a shame.

Regardless of what you choose, remember to use it cautiously, infrequently, and judiciously. How would you like to have your boss stand over you with an object and threaten you with it every time you slowed down your production?


The proper way to use any of them is with the slightest touch at first and then waiting to see what reaction you get. If more is needed, then a little harder touch is in order. You may have to be quite determined with some horses, es-

pecially if they're trying their best to go over or through you. Regardless, always start with a very soft touch or gesture, and increase it slowly until you get the results you're looking for.

Too often we remember that it took a certain amount of "whack" to get the horse going and then we instantly resort to that same level of "whack" every time. Always try with the lightest effort first and then increase only as needed. Ideally your body position should do most of the work along with a slight brush with your legs (notice I didn't say kick).





Funds Available to Help Sheep & Goat Industries

olorado Springs, CO - In 1999 an agreement was signed between the National Sheep Industry Improvement Center (Sheep Center) and the National Livestock Producers Association (NLPA) that enables Sheep Center funds to be used in the sheep and goat industries. The agreement allowed NLPA to establish a revolving fund that is used exclusively for loans with the following goals:

- To make capital available for enhancing business methods and services.
- To improve marketing efficiency and product quality.
- To promote coordination and cooperation within the industry.
- To create opportunities for adding value to sheep and goat products.

According to the terms of the agree-

ment the Sheep and Goat Fund Committee, which consists of members of NLPA and representatives of the sheep and goat industries, is responsible for the oversight of Fund. The Committee regularly reviews applications and is only allowed to consider loans up to \$1 million that are submitted by eligible entities (sole proprietors are not eligible as written into the legislation that established the Sheep Center).

To date, the NLPA Sheep & Goat Fund has extended 41 loans to 31 entities in 19 states and has received 63 applications. More than \$14 million has been loaned to the sheep and goat businesses, leaving funds still available for new applications at a current interest rate of 4.5%.

"We hope to get all of the money loaned

soon so it can help to stabilize and build the industry," Richard Drake, chairman of the NLPA Sheep & Goat Fund Committee, said. "The Fund has already helped the industry by establishing loans that have reasonable risk but may otherwise not be considered by most banks. Currently, loans have been made in many areas, including genetic development, sheep and goat dairies, lamb and goat meat processing, and fiber processing. The Sheep & Goat Fund Committee will consider any worthwhile project that will benefit our industry."

Raising Dorpers In Texas

rt Fredrickson grew up on a farm near Hayden, CO. The land and animals have formed his character. Not one to quit when his health began to be troublesome, he and his wife, Linda, had an opportunity to buy 130 acres in N.E. Texas and return to the land and raise animals. After considerable research they decided to raise Dorper sheep. A relatively new breed in the U.S. the Dorper is a hair sheep developed in Africa with the ability to thrive and raise lambs of good quality under poor forage conditions where other breeds can barely exist. The Dorper ewe is instinctively fond of it's lambs and produces ample milk for twins or triplets. Art has a fullblood ewe who raised triplets that weighed a combined 210 pounds at 3 months. Dorpers produce lambs every 8 months. Lambs grow rapidly and have a high weaning weight. The Dorper carcass is lean. Dorpers are calm and require less labor. The Fredricksons are producing percentage ewes and soon will have purebred ewes for sale as well as fullbloods for the breeder's market. They are also developing a market for healthful, naturally fed freezer lambs.

Linda bottle raised a lamb she named Sugar. Whenever Linda walks through the pasture, Sugar still runs to greet her. Last November, a local youth minister came by and asked for a lamb that could be in the Christmas pageant. He took Sugar. The pageant ran for two days, and Sugar enjoyed all the attention. The story of the good shepherd who leaves the 90 and 9 in search of the lost lamb has new meaning for Art

Katahdins, a Shedding Meat Sheep Developed in North America

atahdins are a breed of hair sheep developed in the Unit-ed States. The Katahdin breed originated at the Piel Farm in north central Maine where Michael Piel was an innovator and amateur geneticist who enjoyed raising livestock. From Maine the breed has spread throughout all states, provinces and countries in North America and into the Caribbean and South America.

A key theme of the Katahdin from its beginnings in the 1950s is that Michael Piel selected for sheep with utility, good meat production and no shearing. Michael Piel started out raising wool sheep, but by the second half of the 1950's realized the potential and importance of separating meat from wool production. In November of 1957 he imported "African Hair Sheep" as they were called then from St Croix. All of the foundation animals were born triplets, unrelated for many generations and woolless. They were bred to various breeds including Suffolk, Hampshire, Southdown, Tunis, Cheviots and other "Down" breeds in various combinations. Michael Piel selected for hair coat and shedding, meat-type conformation, high fertility and flocking instinct. In the early 1970s' Piel felt he had come close to his goal of a "meat sheep that did not require shearing". He selected 120 of the best ewes and called them "Katahdin" sheep after Mt Katahdin, the highest point in Maine.

In 1985, Katahdin Hair Sheep International (KHSI) was incorporated as a breed association. By 2000, KHSI was ranked in the top 5 for the year for the numbers of sheep registered in the United States. Also, an important mile stone in the 21st century is an unprecedented interest in Katahdins by universities and government research stations in North America. By 2002, active research programs at ten universities and

USDA stations included Katahdins.

Katahdins are a medium-sized maternal breed of sheep with breed standards for ewes of 140-185 pounds. Katahdins typically twin and are both hardy and adaptable. Research studies at Louisiana State University, Virginia Tech University, Virginia State University and USDA-ARS in Booneville Arkansas indicate Katahdins have parasite resistance intermediate between the highly parasite resistant breeds and wool sheep. From over 5000 litters, the National Sheep Improvement Program (NSIP) calculates the average number of lambs/litter for mature Katahdin ewes is 2.1 lambs. They are adaptable and are raised from Alaska and Northern Alberta and Saskatchewan into South America. In recent years, we know of the export of Katahdin genetics to Ecuador, Philippines, Caribbean countries and Chile.

Katahdin breeders are emphasizing performance. These key production and profit traits require selection based on data recording and not visual evaluation. Currently, Katahdins are the only hair sheep breed in the USA involved in cross-flock performance evaluation in NSIP and produce a ranked sire summary. In 2005, there were more Katahdin flocks in NSIP than any other breed of sheep.

Katahdins function in several meat producing systems. Currently, Katahdin lambs are marketed into different meat markets including 100 pound grass-fed markets, 100-120 pound Midwestern markets and the ethnic market at 60-90 pounds. To reach the 140-150 pound Midwestern market, producers use terminal sires on their Katahdin ewes to reach that size efficiently. Besides the moderate sized Katahdin ewes, a few Katahdin breeders are selecting for increased frame, muscling and growth. A few breeders are identifying select



Katahdin rams that reach 200 pounds in 12 months.

A region where Katahdins are increasing in popularity is the Pacific states. Katahdins perform well in humid climates and areas where nematode parasites thrive. In terms of registered flocks, the state of Washington ranks 4th for all states and 10% of all registered flocks are found in the three Pacific Coast states. Currently, there are few Katahdin flocks in the Intermountain and Rocky Mountain States. Often, these Western flocks derive significant income from fine wool. If wool production becomes less profitable, shedding sheep will become more important in these regions. Besides farm flocks, Katahdins are increasing in popularity in the Southern Plains. There are numerous flocks with several hundred Katahdin or Katahdin crossed ewes being managed in rotational or management intensive grazing operations in which the sheep never see a barn or a jugging pen. These operations require a hardy sheep with excellent maternal behavior and lamb vigor.

In conclusion, the signature traits of Katahdins include hardiness, lamb vigor, moderately prolific (twinning), moderate size, aseasonal breeding and parasite resistance.

Buyer Beware!

ost people do not realize that goats get lice and mites! Goats can also transmit some diseases to your kids or yourself. All goats should be vaccinated, wormed and have preventive health care procedures such as regular fecal exams and lice preventions. These regular scheduled vaccinations and treatments are time consuming, but worth it to keep your goats healthy. Be sure to keep a written medical history of all vaccinations and worming dates, this helps you and your veterinarian keep your goat healthy for years.

If you are looking to purchase a pygmy goat for you or your children start doing some research.

Do you have the yard space, shelter and fence needed?

Can you supply him with goat feed, hay and grass ALL year long?

Can you give the vaccinations & worming medications yourself or do you have a veterinarian that is in your area that will see goats or other ruminants?

These are just a few questions you should consider. Search the web, read articles and books.

Goats are one of the easiest and best animals to have and own!!! They make wonderful family pets, but they need regular vaccinations and worming to keep them healthy. They also need a nutritionally complete feed just for goats, not a horse feed or cow feed (other animal feeds can contain too much or too little essential amino acids, vitamins, minerals, proteins, fats and other nutrients that can harm your goat over a period of time.)

Selecting a Breeder:

Make sure you ask questions, even if you are just looking for a pet goat and can only afford a small amount. Be sure to:

Ask the breeder about their vaccination, worming and lice prevention schedules.

Ask if they have a written health record of the animal.

Ask what products they use for worming, what type of vaccinations and were to get the products.

Ask about feet trimming and other



grooming needs and how to do them yourself.

Ask the breeder about feeds, hays and grasses in your area and mineral supplements.

If the breeder tells you goats DO NOT NEED vaccinations or worming, or cannot provide you with written documentation of vaccinations and worming the goat has received, then I would think twice about purchasing from that breeder or individual!

I have received emails from people buying from individuals or breeders, paying \$30-50.00 for a little pygmy goat with no papers, with horns and not banded (castrated males). Many problems developed later that coast the owner money and/or loss of their goat.

Several people were told "they (goats) don't need any shots or worming! Just put them (goats) in your yard and they will eat all your weeds....they don't need extra feed or shelter!" These emails and conversations have been from people all over the country. Several had their new goats die. They were heart broken because they already became attached to their new friend.

Many were sold little bucks as pets: Most people do not realize that bucks start maturing around 4 months old. If they have horns they can start doing damage to house, barn, fences or worse, butting and hitting people or children. Horns on goats can be very dangerous if the pet is for children or an older person. Most Bucks are not even butting with their horns to be aggressive, they are just playing very hard, but they can still do harm or damage.

Young male kids can start "Rutting", which is when a male goat urinates on his face, chest and legs as early as 4-5 months old. They start smelling very bad (to attract Does) along with their hair becoming sticky to the touch. This smell usually does not come off with a bath and after a few weeks the children, that had an adorable pet, do not want to play or touch him any longer... the animal is usually given away or sold because the parents did not know about owning a young buck. Wethers (castrated males) should always be sold to a family looking for a wonderful pet, never a young Buck!

A good reliable breeder will help you select the type of goat that is right for you and your family, not just try to sell you what they have available. Just remember to ask questions and know what you are getting and most of all do your homework!

definitely didn't grow up thinking I'd want to spend my life working with **_**goats.I didn't really care for them one way or the other come to think of it, having only been exposed to the occasional pygmy goats and sway-backed hubians one often finds in petting zoos. Yet I certainly want to spend the rest of my life working with goats now, and have been hard at it for the past five years... so what changed?

The first step came through a stroke of luck when as a freshman in Animal Science at the University of California, Davis, I began working at the Goat Teaching and Research Facility. The animals themselves quickly won me over, for it was here that I first made the acquaintance of the angular and stylish dairy goat. In addition to working as a student milker and getting myself in up to my elbows (literally) during kidding season, I found myself among the group of students who comprised the UC Davis Goat Show team, tagging along on visits to local breeders, and volunteering during industry training sessions in animal my appreciation for both the animals and the industry, and I found myself envisioning means of working raising dairy goats



into a career. I decided that cheese mak-

that as my goal, the logical destination was France, the country of cheese. I contacted the international work exchange program Agriventure, which found me a host site with a farmstead goat cheese maker and helped me through the process of applying for a work visa.

I spent one year living in the rural village of La Peyratte in the western part of France. The primary source of income is its' goat cheese; winner of multiple medals, including gold, in national competition. Behind the success of this cheese are Guilloteau and the rich milk other herd of-Poitevine goats. I found myself integrated into farm life and the community surprisingly fast, and the daily routine of twice a day milking and cheese making was labor intensive but' fulfilling. I was even given the opportunity to visit several neighboring goat dairies where I witnessed every extreme in goat dairying from animals kept on pasture with hand-milking to vast barns filled with goats with automated rotating parlors. The farm in La Peyratte fell in the middle, with animals pastured during the day but housed inside overnight. Surprisingly I found myself using the same milking system I'd been trained on at Davis which made me feel almost immediately at home. As my comfort with the language and culture increased, I found myself exploring even farther, talking to cheese makers wherever I traveled and always tasting new and more complex cheeses, searching for inspiration. I even had the opportunity to attend the International Cheese and Dairy Products Exposition held in Paris where I was introduced to some of the top producers and sellers in


the skill and craftsmanship of Maryline

Ten months into my stay I took the reigns of the entire cheese making operation for three weeks while Maryline left the country to visit trainees from previous years in Quebec. The responsibility was daunting, especially after having spent the last ten months learning how complex and delicate cheese making can be. After three weeks without customers being able to detect that the head cheese maker was out, I felt the relief and satisfaction of knowing that I had truly found my calling.

The hardest part of my training program was finally leaving it behind. I had spent a year living and working with the family Guilloteau, joined the local theater group in its annual production, traveled to nearly every comer of France in a way that no tourist ever could, and had become so fluent in my use of everyday French that strangers couldn't place my origins. 
Using Dorsets In Commercial Operation

he Dorset breed has been known as a "ewe breed" in the commercial side of the sheep business. Dorset blood in the ewe flock is a real asset in a commercial operation. Not only does the Dorset have the early lambing ability, but also the Dorset grades and cross-breds have the early lambing ability in a large degree. If one wishes early lambs, he should use the Dorset ram, no matter what sort of ewe he may have. The Dorset ram will be apt to get the ewes bred earlier than any other ram would; and the ewe lambs sired by the Dorset will have the early lambing ability. Cross-bred Dorset Merino ewes were developed in the eastern commercial flocks over seventy-five years ago. This cross made an outstanding commercial ewe.

In some ways, cross-bred Dorset ewes are equally as good-money makers as purebred Dorset ewes. They are cheaper, very hardy, and are usually good shearers. If one is in the 'hothouse" lamb business, he cannot get along without Dorset blood in his ewe flock. Dorset produce all year round to keep up with market demands, and due to their milking ability and carcass traits, can produce an excellent quality lamb at 45-60 pounds.

It has also been learned through research that the Dorset fits well in most any type of cross-bred commercial operation. The Dorset will cross well with the Rambouillet, Finn, Targhee, Polypay and other white faced ewes. By adding this Dorset blood in the commercial ewe, the early lambing ability, milking qualities, mothering instincts and carcass qualities are greatly enhanced. The Dorset also works well in a two-breed rotation using one of the black faced breeds. This cross makes a very desirable slaughter weight lamb.

Ewes carrying Dorset blood are much



better milkers than other ewes and have a better sense in caring for their lambs. If one cannot get purebred Dorset ewes, let him get purebred rams and breed his own cross-bred ewes. The half-blood will be good; when he gets three-quarter-blodos, they will in some respects, be superior to even the purebred Dorset. Dorset rams will work the year round. It is a known fact that the use of Dorset rams on any kind of cross-bred or purebred ewe

will tend to bring earlier lambs. Two Dorset rams will tend to bring earlier lambs. Two Dorset rams will do the work of three or four rams of other


So, Mr. Commercial Sheepman, keep this in mind - milk makes the lamb and Dorset make the milk while having lambs year round with excellent carcass qualities. Dorsets have now become "The Breed For All Seasons... The Breed For All Reasons".

Raising Alpacas and Loving It Ranchers Find that Raising Alpacas as Personally and Financially Rewarding

t's your business. It's in your blood. It has been passed on from generation to generation. If you've raised livestock all your life and have thought about adding an alternative livestock, alpacas might be the answer.

Many ranchers find that in addition to raising cows, horses, and other livestock, raising alpacas offers countless benefits – benefits that are hard to match. Alpacas are beautiful, intelligent animals that are easy to handle and raise, require minimal acreage and food, and can offer numerous financial benefits.

Alpacas, cousins to the llama, are native to the Andean Mountain range of South America, particularly Peru, Bolivia, and Chile. Once an Incan civilization treasure, alpacas provided clothing and transportation. Their luxurious fleece was reserved for royalty and was known as the "fiber of gods".

The United States first commercially imported alpacas in 1984. What began as a small, intimate alpaca community has blossomed into an official national organization, the Alpaca Owners and Breeders Association (AOBA). That was over twenty years ago. Today, AOBA proudly boasts more than 4,000 members and over 65,000 registered alpacas nationwide.

A Breeze. That's how Cindy Harris of Alpacas at Windy Hill in Somis, California describes caring for alpacas compared to other livestock. "Alpacas eat less, they don't break fences and water lines," says Cindy.

Adult alpacas stand at approximately 36 inches at the withers and generally weigh between 150 and 200 pounds. They do not have horns, hooves, claws or incisors. Alpacas are





alert, intelligent, curious, and predictable. Social animals that seek companionship, alpacas communicate most commonly by humming, but neck posturing, ear and tail positioning, and head tilting are other communication methods.

Cindy has been raising alpacas for over 7 years. Cindy learned about alpacas through her friend. "With 14 acres you ought to have alpacas," her friend told her. Cindy will never forget her response.

"What's an alpaca?"

After 6 months of convincing, Cindy's friend got her to visit an alpaca farm to see these animals first hand. It was love at first sight. Today, 35 suris and 6 huacayas reside on Cindy's 14 acres of land.

Although almost physically identical, what distinguishes the two types of alpacas is their fiber. The Huacaya (wa-Ki'-ah) is the more common of the two and has a fluffy, extremely fine coat. The Suri (surrey) is the rarer of the two and has fiber that is silky and resembles pencil-locks.

With their gentle personalities, alpacas are the perfect livestock to raise as a family business. "I wish I had found alpacas when my kids were young," says Cindy. "As it is, they are grown and out of the house."

But there's more to alpacas than the fact that their easy to handle and have such appealing personalities. Simply put, they are beautiful animals. And for Kirsten Kraushaar, her first experience with alpacas was mesmerizing. Kirsten and her family attended several county fairs and met their first alpacas at the Chisago County Fair in Minnesota. Kirsten's family had a hard time getting her to leave the area. "I finally pulled myself away," Kirsten recalls, "but took all the

information I could along with me."

It took Kirsten quite a while to convince her family to agree to start raising alpacas. Eventually, they restored an old barn on their 20 acre farm outside of Cambridge, MN. Knowing they wanted animals to complement the retreat center they were opening for teenagers, Kirsten's family was finally convinced alpacas were the way to go. The choice was clear for two reasons. The Kraushaars found that alpacas were a wonderful addition to the work they were already doing with kids. Plus, Kirsten had a passion for textile arts and was interested in rekindling her interest in weaving and spinning.

Aside from their 15 huacayas, now on their farm, Soulfood Alpaca Garden, the Kraushaars also raise horses, angora rabbits, guinea fowl and chickens. Kirsten finds alpacas to be the most rewarding. "Daily chores are not difficult," says Kirsten, "and interacting with the alpacas is very rewarding. It is easy to become attached and tuned in to these creatures."

Another desirable aspect of the alpaca industry to many is the fact that alpacas don't have to be killed to be profitable. Alpacas are shorn, without harm, every twelve to eighteen months. They produce a luxurious fiber that is stronger, warmer, and lighter than wool and is frequently compared to the softness of cashmere. Making it even more desirable, alpaca fiber is hypo-allergenic, contains no lanolin, and comes in 22 natural colors.

in Geneva, Nebraska adding alpacas to their cattle ranch made sense. The

Wilkins's know cattle. For them, it has been a lifelong business. They've raised Angus cattle, registered quarter horses, and hogs as well as feeding cattle commercially. For 40 years, they ran a cow-calf operation. They then began a livestock insurance business that included alpacas. Seeing the many benefits of raising alpacas, expanding their herd was logical. Says Janet, "Our initial investment was with seven open females, who we bred right away."

While cattle graze on several barrels of hay, alpacas need only a small amount of grass and hay daily. In fact, a single, 60-pound bale of hay can generally feed a group of about 20 alpacas for one day. Cattle are significantly larger and often damage the land, whereas alpacas, with their soft-padded feet, are more envi-

ronmentally friendly. Clean-up is easy since alpacas deposit droppings in communal piles.

The average lifespan of an alpaca is 20 years, with a gestation of 11.5 months. Female alpacas normally give birth, without assistance, in the daylight hours and typically have single births. Twins, although extremely rare, are possible.



The most recent figure notes that 1 in 2000 is a twin.

Janet continues, "We're reaping the benefits now. By the time the crias or baby alpacas were six-months old, we were showing and selling for a profit."


And yet it was. Dad had passed away and they were selling the ranch. Hopes of raising my son in the tradition of three generations was gone..... or so I thought.





wind resources would easily yield much of the new power that the country will need in the years ahead.

Strong demand

Public opinion surveys conducted over the years at the national and local levels typically show strong backing for renewable energy and wind power.

A recent example is the 10th annual University of Nebraska poll, taken in 2005. Ninety percent of respondents agreed the government should encourage use of renewable energy sources, and more than 80 percent agreed that producing more ethanol and biodiesel blended fuels and generating more electricity with wind turbines would benefit Nebraska's economy. Eighty-four percent said wind power can be produced and used locally.

Bruce Johnson, an Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources agricultural economist, said he has long sensed strong support for alternative energy among rural Nebraskans, but the magnitude of the results surprised him. "This strong response sends a clear signal to our public electric utilities to accelerate

their efforts to move ahead with wind power," Johnson said. "This tells policy-makers that Nebraskans want this to be part of their future."

Obstacles to growth need to be overcome

So, if wind can make such a positive difference, why isn't it growing even faster? There are constraints that hobble wind energy's growth, and these are largely regulatory and political—and no less formidable for being man-made rather than imposed by nature or technology.

Inefficient, discriminatory transmission rules make it currently infeasible to tap the country's vast potential in a big way and ship large amounts of wind power from the windy heartland to market. Strategic upgrades to existing lines and investment in new transmission lines are also needed. Removing these constraints would allow the heartland to export home-grown, inexhaustible, clean wind energy year-round to powerhungry centers in the nation, instead of importing ever-larger amounts of natural gas and other fuels.

The largest single constraint for utility-scale wind power remains the short-

term extensions and then expirations of the very effective, but intermittent, federal incentive for wind energy, the production tax credit. A long-term planning horizon, and in particular a long-term extension of the credit, is needed for businesses to plan for strategic growth in the years ahead and expand their wind energy operations on a large scale.

For small wind turbines for residential, farming, or small business use, a federal incentive is needed to help bring down the up-front cost of the purchase of the equipment. Small wind turbines—which can work well on farms and ranches in windy locations—help lower electricity bills and reduce the use of electricity generated with polluting fuels.

Rolling back these constraints would ensure wind energy's steady growth over time, bring a variety of benefits to rural communities, and help diversify the nation's energy portfolio with a safe, clean, abundant resource—home-grown here in the American heartland.
